

The Malthouse Project

Visit the last remaining Old Maltings in Bury St Edmunds, which is of great historical significance to this important brewing town. The Malthouse Project, a former 17th century maltings once owned by Greene King, is now a unique facility that provides a café and heritage centre. Tours of the project offer an insight into the building's history and the maltings process with a replica 'mini' model, a museum of original artefacts and architectural finds dating back to the 1600s.

Open every Saturday 9am – 3pm for self-led tours and Wednesday 12 – 4pm for guided tours booked in advance.

The Suffolk Regiment Museum

The Keep houses the Regimental Headquarters of the Royal Anglian Regiment, the local Army Recruiting Office and the Suffolk Regiment Museum.

The Museum was opened in 1935 and owed its existence to the enthusiasm of Lieut-Col H B Monier-Williams. The displays tell the story of the regiment from its foundations in 1685 to amalgamation with the Royal Norfolk Regiment in 1959. The history covers the regular, militia, volunteer and war-time battalions as well as the experience of individual soldiers and is told through medals, uniforms, photographs, weapons, equipment and personal memorabilia.

Open 1st and 3rd Wednesday and 1st Sunday of every month between 9.30am – 3.30pm. Entry is free.

These are just some of the wonderful attractions in Bury St Edmunds whilst you are here don't forget to visit St Mary's Church which is the third largest Parish Church in the country and has the second largest aisle or The Nutshell Pub which is recorded in the Guinness Book of Records as the smallest pub in Britain, or finally our historic Abbey Ruins where it is said that in 1214 AD the barons responsible for the Magna Carta met and swore an oath that they would force King John to accept the Charter of Liberties. This would be known as the Magna Carta.

Information for organisers

Coaches are able to drop their passengers on Angel Hill, IP33 1UZ which is central for both the historic core and the shopping areas of town. Fully accessible toilets are located within the Abbey Ruins and are open between 7.30am – 7.30pm in the summer and 7.30am - 6pm in the winter. We are also able to offer a free 'meet and greet' service for pre-booked coaches.

Alternatively you can use the bus and coach station to drop off and pick up passengers. The bus station is open

between 8am – 6pm. Facilities include accessible toilets and a waiting room. All excursion coaches must be pre-booked. Contact 01284 702020 or email bus.station@stedsbc.gov.uk

Guided tours are available daily at 2pm from May – end September. Meet at the Tourist Information Centre. Tours cost £4 per person (£3 for concessions) accompanying children are free.

Moyse's Hall Museum

Moyse's Hall Museum is one of England's few surviving Norman houses, and is believed to be the oldest town house in East Anglia. Since 1899 it has been the town's local history museum. Inside is a fine selection of unsavoury items such as man-traps, gibbet cages and mummified cats. Most of all, relics of the Murder in the Red Barn, celebrated in Victorian melodrama, including the guilty William Corder's scalp and a book bound in his skin! Also featuring collections and history from the town and Abbey, the Suffolk Regiment, clocks and time pieces, fine art and social history. New exhibition for 2009 - Women by Women - an exhibition looking at works by local female artists.

St Edmundsbury Cathedral

Built by Abbot Anselm in the 12th century and with later building work carried out by John Wastell in the 16th century and Stephen Dykes Bower in the early 1960s, it had been the last incomplete cathedral in Britain. However, work has recently finished to crown the cathedral with a 140 foot Gothic-style tower that will be a feature on the town's skyline for future generations.

Daily tours are available from Easter Monday to end September at 11.30am.

Greene King Visitor Centre

Greene King has been brewing in Bury St Edmunds since 1799. The museum's storyboards, illustrations and artefacts provide a great insight into the history of brewing. Take a tour around the historic brewhouse and see how real ale is produced using natural ingredients and traditional brewing methods. The tour includes one of the best views of Bury St Edmunds (weather permitting). Finish the tour in the Brewery Tap, where you get to sample some of the fantastic beers.

The visitor centre is open Monday - Saturday 10.30am - 4.30pm and entrance to the visitor centre and shop is free.

Daily tours are suitable for individuals and groups and are available on: Monday 11am, Tuesday 2pm, Wednesday - Friday 11am and 2pm, Saturday 11am, 12.30pm and 2pm and Sunday 11.30am.

Price £8 per person, discounts are available for groups.

*Evening tours are available Monday - Fridays at 7pm (booking essential)
Price £10 per person, discounts are available for groups.*

Children under 12 are not permitted on tours, 12 - 18 years olds must be accompanied by an adult. Tours are not suitable for people with limited mobility.
